

THE HEAD START MODEL: A PROVEN SUCCESS

Education

Leaning on decades of brain science, Head Start staff work with children to build the brain connections and self-confidence necessary for success in kindergarten and beyond.

Health

Providing dental, health, and mental health services and referrals, as well as healthy eating based on current nutritional best practices, and early identification of health problems, Head Start addresses critical health and nutrition needs so that children are fully ready to learn and grow.

Local Design

Acknowledging that each community has different strengths, resources, and challenges, each program is designed to reflect the traditions, priorities, and cultures of their community.

Believing that parents are a child's first and most important teachers, Head Start requires parent involvement in major program decision-making. Head Start works with parents to put them on a path of economic self-reliance through goal-setting, parenting training, and genuine engagement, enabling parents to join the workforce and stay working.


NATIONWIDE, COMPREHENSIVE, MULTI-GENERATIONAL
